NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

The financial statements cover AFGHAN AUSTRALIAN DEVELOPMENT ORGANISATION as an individual entity. AFGHAN AUSTRALIAN DEVELOPMENT ORGANISATION is a not-for-profit association incorporated in VIC under the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012 ('the Act') and registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission.

The principal activities of the Association for the year ended 30 June 2023 are to implement projects that assist in the reconstruction and sustainable development of communities within Afghanistan.

The functional and presentation currency of AFGHAN AUSTRALIAN DEVELOPMENT ORGANISATION is Australian dollars.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations and the other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012. They have also been prepared in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements set out in the ACFID Code of Conduct. For further information about the Code please refer to the ACFID website www.acfid.asn.au.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

At the end of each reporting period the association determines whether there is evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where this indicator exists and regardless for goodwill, indefinite life intangible assets and intangible assets not yet available for use, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated.

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cashgenerating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from an asset or cash-generating unit.

Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss, except for goodwill.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts also form part of cash equivalents for the purpose of the statement of cash flows and are presented within current liabilities on the balance sheet.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the association and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Interest revenue

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

Rendering of services

Revenue in relation to rendering of services is recognised depending on whether the outcome of the services can be estimated reliably. If the outcome can be estimated reliably then the stage of completion of the services is used to determine the appropriate level of revenue to be recognised in the period. If the outcome cannot be reliably estimated then revenue is recognised to the extent of expenses recognised that are recoverable.

If the outcome cannot be reliably estimated then revenue is recognised to the extent of expenses recognised that are recoverable.

Revenue from training services is generally recognised once the training has been delivered.

Subscriptions

Revenue from the provision of membership subscriptions is recognised on a straight line basis over the financial year.

Other income

Other income is recognised on an accruals basis when the association is entitled to it.

Comparative Amounts

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

Where a change in comparatives has also affected the opening retained earnings previously presented in a comparative period, an opening statement of financial position at the earliest date of the comparative period has been presented.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial report of AFGHAN AUSTRALIAN DEVELOPMENT ORGANISATION (the association) which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2023 and the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, and management's assertion statement.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the Basis of Qualified Opinion section of our report, the accompanying financial report of the association for the year ended 30 June 2022 is prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012, Division 60 of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and the ACFID Code of Conduct including:

- a) giving a true and fair view of the association's financial position as at 30 June 2023 and of its performance for the year then ended on that date; and
- b) complying with Australian Accounting Standards to the extent described in Note 1 and complying with the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012, Division 60 of the Australian Charities and Notfor-profits Commission Act 2012 and the ACFID Code of Conduct.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

All charity expenses are paid for by cash in Afghanistan and while receipts are not provided for these expenses, worksheets listing the expenses are prepared and signed by two authorised persons and given to the committee for review and ratification. Accordingly, as the evidence available to us from this source was limited, our audit procedures with respect to cash payments made in Afghanistan were based on the worksheets and the amounts recorded in the financial records.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report section of our report. We are independent of the association in accordance with the auditor independence requirements of the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110 Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (the code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the code.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.
